

Nomura Finalizes Donations to Support Coronavirus Efforts

Tokyo, August 12, 2020—Nomura Holdings, Inc. today announced that it will donate a total of about 115,800,000 yen (US\$1.1 million)¹ to help in the ongoing fight against coronavirus. As announced on May 15, 2020, Nomura has been coordinating donations from its employees in each region across the world and matched qualifying donations.

Donations collected in Japan and matched by the firm in the amount of 19,097,400 yen will be donated through crowdfunding platform READYFOR, Inc. to support efforts in Japan to prevent the further spread of the virus. And, an approximately 17,000,000 yen in matched donations from Asia ex-Japan, EMEA and the Americas will be donated to the Japan Association for the World Food Programme.

In addition, an approximate total of 80,000,000 yen in matched donations from employees in Asia ex-Japan, EMEA and the Americas will be donated to about 90 organizations such as food banks, organizations supporting children and those providing medical relief.

Nomura extends its deepest condolences to the victims and their families and prays for a swift recovery from this disaster.
